While philosophy has primarily been focused on the past, many more philosophers than expected have considered the future as a privileged dimension of time. We are interested in the metaphysical, ontological, epistemological, ethical and existential outcomes yielded by a philosophy focused on the future. We further welcome papers on utopian or dystopian perspectives, logical and categorical investigations into the interrelation among past, present and the future, as well as historical or systematic approaches.

Topics of interest include, but are not limited to

- Historical and philosophical approaches to the Future (discussed in the thought of one or more philosophers, or covering a period within the history of philosophy)
- Epistemology and the Future (does the emphasis on this dimension have any influence on epistemology? How relevant is the Future for the construction of scientific -physical, logical, mathematical, biological- theories?)
- Ontology and Metaphysics of the Future (is there room for the Future within branches of philosophy traditionally dealing with the 'unchanging and nontemporal'? Can the Future 'change' ontology and metaphysics?)
- Ethics and the Future (how may our anticipation of the Future influence moral behaviour, theories of happiness, or our conception the good and of virtues)
- Religious thought and the Future (conceptions of the beyond, theories of immortality – how does our anticipation of a life beyond shape our present/our world?)
- Politics and the Future (political utopia as a possible Future, political strategies -old and new- to approaching the Future)
- Anticipating the Future of Philosophy (in the universities, in the society)
